

Anniversary of the 1967 Referendum May

On 1 January 1901, the Australian Constitution came into effect. establishing the Commonwealth of Australia. There were two references to Aboriginal people contained in the Australian Constitution of 1901.

Firstly, section 51 of the Constitution gave the Commonwealth power to make laws with respect to 'people of any race, other than the Aboriginal race in any state, for whom it was deemed necessary to make special laws."

Secondly, section 127 of the Constitution provided that 'in reckoning the numbers of people of the Commonwealth, or of a State or other part of the Commonwealth, aboriginal natives shall not be counted'.

State governments, not Federal, were responsible for the welfare of Aboriginal people until the 1967 referendum - a critical difference.

Did you know that from 1947 Torres Strait Islander People were counted in the official Commonwealth census but were first classified as Polynesians, then as Pacific Islanders? Prior to this, Torres Strait Islanders were regarded as 'aboriginal natives' and were excluded from population figures if they were of more than 50 per cent Torres Strait Islander heritage.

On 27 May 1967, the Australian Government held a referendum. This was a momentous turning point in Australian history. More than 90% of Australian voters chose 'Yes' to count Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the census and give the Australian Government the power to make laws for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

The purpose of the 1967 Referendum was to make two changes to the Australian Constitution. These changes enabled the Commonwealth Government to:

(i)Make laws for all the Australian people by amending s51 of the Constitution (previously people of the 'Aboriginal race in any state' were excluded); and

(ii) Take account of Aboriginal people in determining the population of Australia by repealing s127 of the constitution (formerly, Aboriginal people had been haphazardly included in the census but not counted for the purposes of Commonwealth funding grants to the states or territories)

From 1967, Aboriginal people were counted in the census and included in base figures for Commonwealth funding granted to the states and territories on a per capita basis.

Contrary to popular thinking the 1967 Referendum did NOT

- give Aboriginal peoples the right to vote
- give Aboriginal peoples citizenship rights
- give Aboriginal peoples the right to be counted in the census.

#### The timeless and living art of possum skin cloaks

he First Peoples of south-eastern ustralia have been making possum skin loaks since time immemorial—today the ractice is flourishing.

rishing, birdwatching, parenthood, ommutes—these are among the stories old by two new objects in a Melbourne duseum which continue a custom arracticed in south-eastern Australia since ime immemorial.

or tens of thousands of years, possum skin toaks protected First Peoples from cold nd rain, mapped Country, told, and held, tories. They still do—possum skin cloak naking has undergone a revival. Today, the ractice is flourishing. And while it is a radition which connects people to their ncestors, 21st century community tell tories both timeless and contemporary hrough their designs.

'The markings were not just pretty patterns, they were deep, meaningful, iconography of Country, of totem and of place.'

Melbourne Museum is the custodian of two cloaks from the 19th century. Southeastern Australia Aboriginal Collections senior curator Kimberley Moulton says there may only be three others from the 
period anywhere in the world. Because, 
prior to European colonisation, a person's 
possum skin cloak was intimately entwined 
with their life story. From the moment of 
their birth to their death—and into the 
afterlife. And if possum pelt was the first 
material object an infant might touch, the 
luscious fur would also be their last.

Traditionally, people were buried in their cloaks. 'Traditionally ... we would have possum skin cloaks from when we were a baby,' the curator and Yorta Yorta woman says. 'They might've been four or five pelts big and then, as you grew, you would add on to that.'
